Sodom and Gomorrah

We know what God thought concerning Sodom and Gomorrah before He utterly destroyed those wicked and lawless people and their cities (Gen. 18:20). He told Abraham what He was about to do. Abraham remembered that his nephew Lot and his family had moved to that area and were now living there. Lot is called righteous. Lot was vexed over the practices of those living there (2 Pet. 2:7,8). Abraham said to God "that be far from you to destroy some that are righteous along with the wicked, shall not the Judge of all the earth do right?" So, he pleaded with God and God listened to Abraham, His friend. Abraham said, "will you not save the cities if there be found 50 righteous persons?" God heard, so Abraham went on pleading - what about 45? - and persisted until he got down to as low as 10. The truth is that there were not even 10. God was just in destroying these cities that practised things that were so abhorrent to Him. So, with fire and brimstone, He destroyed these two cities. However, God saved Lot, his wife and 2 daughters; though they were reluctant to go, they were rescued but Lot's wife looked back to where she had come from when told specifically not to do so, and for that was summarily destroyed.

Yes, there were not even 10 righteous persons. The cities were defiled throughout their population. God rightly judged them. "God made man in His image, male and female made He them" (Gen. 1:27). Our world is changing in its attitude and practices, now country after country is going contrary to the will of God. The Apostle Paul writing in Rom. 1:18 says "The wrath of God is revealed from heaven against all ungodliness" ... "because that knowing God they glorified Him not as God." (v 21) ... "Wherefore God gave them up in the lusts of their hearts unto uncleanness, that their bodies should be dishonoured among themselves." (v24) ... "And even as they refused to have God in their knowledge God gave them up to a reprobate mind to do those things which are not fitting." (v28). Read the whole chapter for it explains all of it from the Divine perspective.

Those who love our Lord Jesus will observe what is written in 2 Pet. 1:4, "Whereby He hath granted unto us His precious and exceeding great promises: that through these ye may become partakers of the divine nature, having escaped from the corruption that is in the world by lust."

Planting of the Church of God in Polamaru, Andhra Pradesh, India



Polamaru is a village of around 6000 residents in the East Godavari District of Andhra Pradesh, about 3km from the Church of God in Ramavaram. It was the local overseer in Ramavaram, David Raju, who is now at home with the Lord, who first made contact with the group in Polamaru just before the Covid pandemic struck. After Covid restrictions eased, brother Prasad Rao and ministering brother Kiran, of Podagatlapalli Assembly, were able to resume visits to the group. The group have been functioning in their premises as an independent church for some 20 years, but through the presentation of the teaching of the Lord regarding His pattern for Churches of God linked in collective service, they came to appreciate the importance of the way of the Lord in this regard.

The recent visit of Craig and Carole Jones provided an opportunity to spend a further four teaching sessions with the group, helping to consolidate the foundational teaching so helpfully given already by brothers David Raju, Prasad Rao and Kiran. It was a delight then to be assured together by the Lord's leading that the time was right for an Assembly to be planted based on encouraging, and in some cases very moving, individual interviews with the brothers and sisters in Polamaru, all of whom were already baptised. The Assembly was duly planted on Lord's Day 12 February, with 13 sisters and 7 brothers. Several more sisters and brothers are part of the original group and it's expected that further interviews and additions will take place over the coming weeks.

We're thankful to the Lord for the continued development of the testimony of the Churches of God in Andhra Pradesh and ask that you pray for the saints in the new Assembly, for continued joy in the Lord and establishment in His truth.

Recent Activities in Belfast Belfast Conference January 2023



We were blessed to gather in person for the first time since 2020 for our Belfast Conference on 21 January. We were joined by James Needham (Birmingham), Andy McIlree (Kilmarnock), and Phil and Celia Brennan (Buxton).

James spoke to us about calling on the Name of the LORD (YHWH), bringing us from Genesis into Paul's epistles. The comparison between Cain's line (Gen. 4) and Seth's line (Gen. 5) is marked, and is delineated by the verse, "To Seth also a son was born... Then people began to call upon the name of the LORD" (Gen. 4:26) – and so begins the record of God's appointment and of those who stand distinct from the world. These people still exist today: "Everyone who calls on

the name of the LORD will be saved" (Rom. 10:13), and in community: "all who in every place call on the name of our Lord Jesus Christ" (1 Cor 1:2). We are those who call upon the name of the LORD habitually and stand distinctive from society today.

Andy challenged us from Deut. 2: 3 – "You have circled this mountain long enough. Now turn north...". After so long in the wilderness, the people needed to move forward to claim the full extent of their inheritance. With God, there is always much more inheritance to claim, and we need to challenge ourselves in turning towards it and moving forward. Andy took us around the altar (Ps. 26: 6) – a place which we do not move on from, but which we need to discover more of. Beginning with the North – the secret, hidden side, and the place where the lamb was slaughtered (Lev. 1: 11); South – Ezek. 47 is the only place where the south side of the altar is mentioned – from where the waters flow - waters flowing to parched land, encouraging us to go deeper in our experience of refreshment in our lives of service; East – the Hebrew word means eternal, and at the base of the altar we see the ashes of the sacrifices. From eternity, God has seen the finished work of Christ; West – the side that points to the Holy Place and Most Holy Place, bringing us into deeper fellowship with God through Christ.

The conference was closed by Phil, who took us to 1 Sam. 23 – and the scene of Jonathan coming to find David (whom Saul had struggled to find) that he might "strengthen his hand in God". This is how we can encourage one another – providing an oasis for each other, and a place where we can strengthen one another's hand in God. Paul knew such experiences in the homes of people like Priscilla and Aquila. The Lord Jesus had the same refuge in places like Bethany. We should be like this for one another. Jonathan recognises David as the future King, giving up his place as crown prince. Those who strengthen the hands of others must be prepared to be the lesser. Hand strengtheners take the lesser part – because it's not about self-promotion but about being there for one another.

A.F. Atkinson's first and exploratory visit to Palestine - as it was then - came when he was in his early 40s and just a few months before the Second World War started. The 'diary' he kept from that date - in the form of bi-monthly letters back home to Churches of God published faithfully in Intelligence - form a remarkable historical record of one man's passion to spread the Gospel in general, but in particular to the Jewish people that he loved with the love of Christ.

This book, which includes all the letters as well as his testimony, has been published to be much more than just an interesting archival account, but a help and an encouragement to all who read it who feel a call from the Lord to do His work in whatever field that may be.






Baptism at the Church of God in Ajara

Our brother found much joy in family time. He loved to plan adventurous holidays with his family, packing up the trailer and heading off to the ocean, or canoe trips in Algonquin Park. He was always a good neighbour, helping others out with home

repairs as he shared the Lord with them.

His favourite hobby was woodworking, and it was a skill that he was blessed with. His talent and tools were often put to use for the Lord's work. Many children at camps across the Fellowship happily received a car, truck or a boat at craft time that came from him. His hours of hard dedicated work at Mount Forest Camp will never be forgotten. Also, his craftsmanship both in Brantford and Toronto halls never goes unnoticed.

He will always be remembered for going out into the world and making disciples. McDonalds for a morning coffee was one way he enjoyed reaching out to lost souls. He's well known for his van's back window which displayed his favourite verse, John 3:16. He would often hand out a beautiful print of the verse that has been hung in many people's homes. They even made it as far as the Philippines.

At home with the Lord – Charles (Charlie) Meikle, Hamilton, Ontario



Just five months after the home call of his wife, Jean, our dear brother Charlie was called into the presence of the Lord on 28 January.

Born and raised in Hamilton, his parents among those numbered with the Assembly on its planting in 1928, Charlie accepted the Lord Jesus as his personal Saviour as a young boy, while kneeling in prayer by his bedside. It was an experience he related as one of distinct change within him. He used to say he “felt” quite different from that moment onward. Even into his ninetieth year, that memory was vivid to him and he treasured it.

Charlie’s life was one of faithful service, usually behind the scenes, quietly taking care of matters both practical and spiritual in the Hamilton Assembly where he was in oversight. He also had an evident desire to be a witness of the Gospel and further truths of Scripture in personal testimony. His quiet and friendly demeanour was appreciated by many. For several years he led a lunchtime Bible Study with his office colleagues, many of whom were government scientists and engineers in the Atomic Energy field.

Together with Jean, they raised a family - Mary, Cameron, and Neil. Sadly, in 1983 they sustained the crushing loss of Neil, 19 years of age, to cancer. Through the years the family home was known for its warm hospitality, whatever the day or the hour; likewise, their campsite at Killbear Provincial Park Campground, where many from the Ontario Assemblies spent summer vacations. Charlie was a fixture in the memory of families, paddling his canoe along the rugged coastline.

At the memorial service, family and friends recounted happy memories of Charlie’s influence and care as father, grandfather, and great-grandfather. Bruce Archibald spoke of the final hours spent with Charlie, likening Charlie’s readiness to Simeon’s: “Now lettest thou thy servant depart, O Lord, according to thy word, in peace; For mine eyes have seen thy salvation ...” (Lk. 2:29-30). Geoff Hydon spoke of Charlie’s dedication at Mount Forest Camp (MFC) over many years in keeping machines running smoothly, and the greater challenge of gaining the public health authority’s approval of the water quality. This meant weekly visits in the summer months to MFC and Toronto on long hot days. Tom Ramage, a cousin of Charlie’s, and his oft-times co-worker on many technical challenges at MFC, shared some precious promises of Scripture, set out in poetry. At the graveside Jonathan Thomas related his lifelong enjoyment of Charlie’s friendship, seeing in him his spiritual mentor and strong example, as Paul was to Timothy (2 Tim. 4:7-8), filled with the hope given those whose trust is in the Saviour (Jn. 11:25-26).

Charlie’s race now finished - having fought the good fight of the faith - his reward is sure. His place on earth will remain in the memory of many and dearly missed by his family, including his sister Eunice Higgins of the Assembly in Littleton, Colorado, USA. We ask that prayer for the Lord’s comfort be made for each of them.


